

Gerard Baker

Gerard Baker has been Deputy Editor-in-Chief of The Wall Street Journal and Dow Jones since the start of 2009. His responsibilities range across the full spectrum of the company's journalism, from the daily print and online editions of the Journal to Dow Jones Newswires.

Before joining Dow Jones, Baker was the US Editor and an Assistant Editor of The Times of London, where he wrote news, commentary and columns for Britain's longest continuously published newspaper and oversaw US coverage for the paper and online editions.

From 1994 to 2004, Baker worked for the Financial Times, first as Tokyo Correspondent, where he wrote about the country's financial crisis, and then, from 1998 to 2002, as Washington Bureau Chief, where he led a team of 10 correspondents and provided extensive reporting and analysis of the Federal Reserve. From 2002 to 2004 he was the FT's Chief US Commentator and an Associate Editor.

Before joining the FT, Baker worked for the BBC from 1988 to 1994, as a news producer, then as US producer, then as Economics Correspondent for TV and radio.

In addition to the Journal, the FT, The Times and the BBC, Baker's work has appeared in many other publications and he has been a frequent television and radio contributor in the UK, the US and around the world.

He started his working life as an economist, first in 1984-6 as an analyst at the Bank of England, then at Lloyds Bank in the City of London.

He was educated at Corpus Christi College, Oxford University, where he graduated in 1983 with a First Class Honours Degree in Philosophy, Politics and Economics.
